Introduction...





This is my third monthly report for the newsletter and I've already realised the perils of writing it three weeks before you read it. We will let them run for a few weeks before collecting and analysing the data to see what and how we can publish the findings, possibly in future newsletters. Initial comments from residents in the High Street indicate they are having the desired effect of reducing speed.

My thanks go to each and every one of you who run these and make them possible. I know from experience how much time and energy it takes. A successful Summer Quiz was held at the Community Centre with refreshments provided by our WI members.

Our members were busy again for the craft fair. We are extremely lucky to have such talented bakers who are always ready to support local events.

Hawk Honey was our speaker for June and gave an interesting talk about forgotten bees. Hawk was previously a long distance truck driver until 2013 when he suffered a life changing accident, resulting in a serious shoulder injury. Through following his real passion and volunteering for the Suffolk Wildlife Trust, he developed his interest in bees and wasps. He is now working at Lackford lakes for the Trust. We all learnt about the decline of solitary bees requiring protection from Honey bees. Hawk explained life cycles, predators, importance of providing food, water, bee houses, nest sites, materials etc. Also the importance of not using pesticides. Hawk encouraged us to be untidy gardeners, where possible and plant native species to support an abundance of wildlife.

We met some representatives of The Lighthouse charity for The Women's refuge at the SEFWI annual meeting back in February and were inspired by the stories we heard and the dedication of the volunteers. Our Secretary, Andrea contacted Deb Johnson from the charity, in relation to putting together a donation. Deb specifically requested toiletries, biscuits, tea and coffee. A shop at Aldi's and the items were delivered directly to the refuge. These were warmly received and an insight into their important work was inspiring. We have arranged for Deb to join our meeting in July next year to talk about how the charity supports vulnerable women and children. We hope to continue our support on a regular basis.

citizens advice

September brings a new school year, one of my children is in primary school and the other secondary. Between uniforms, PE kit and knowing they'll need to catch the bus each day the costs are adding up. I'm already pretty stretched, so I'm not sure how to cover these extra outgoings. Is there any help I can get?

A new school year can put pressure on lots of people's budgets, so you're not alone in your worries.

But there is help available. If you are online, a good place

to start is the Citizens Advice website at citizensadvice.org. uk/family/education/helpwith-school-costs where you'll find lots of information on the support you might be entitled to for school-related costs. The help you can get to cover school lunches will vary depending on how old your children are and if you claim benefits. Children in Reception, Year I and 2 automatically get free school meals. You can apply for free school meals for older children if you claim certain types of benefits, including Universal Credit, Child Tax Credit and Income Support.

You mentioned concerns about travel costs. If your child can't walk to school because of special educational needs or disabilities they should get free school transport. You may be Hattie Bennett will be joining us at our next meeting with her talk on 'My Life in Music'.

We will be taking a break from our regular meeting in August but we are arranging outing for our members.

A trip to Dobbie's garden centre was enjoyed by those who went and included a visit to the boatyard where a replica of the ship unearthed at Sutton Hoo is being built.

able to get help with transport costs from Suffolk County Council if your children can't walk because it's dangerous or too far.

If you're on a low income, Suffolk County Council may also be able to help you with activity and school uniform costs. You're likely to be considered to be on a low income if you get meanstested benefits like Universal Credit or Housing Benefit. In some places there are also local charitable schemes that can help. A good place to find out about these is the school itself or Parent Teacher Association (PTA), as both will usually know if these kinds of schemes exist. A lot of people are feeling the squeeze at the moment, but it's important to remember that help is available with school costs and

you're not alone.

If you need more information on getting help with school costs, the advisers at Citizens Advice Mid Suffolk will be happy to help.

Needham Market Neighbourhood Watch

It was interesting to see the report in the EADT that domestic burglary in Suffolk, especially in small towns such as Needham Market, has

reduced by over 50% in the last 2 years. The main reason for this is due to Covid and the introduction of CCTV and doorbell cameras. When most of us were stuck at home at the start of the pandemic we got to know our neighbours and as a result we started to talk and look after each other. Fortunately, as things slowly returned to normal the friendships continued and any stranger that suddenly appeared on the street was quickly challenged. This helped to deter the would-be opportunist thief. The same can be said of doorbell cameras. No longer do you find strangers walking down your path, ringing your doorbell, checking to see if anybody is at home before they attempt to get inside. It's encouraging knowing that there is somebody on every street in town that has CCTV fitted so if your car or garage is broken into it is possible that the thief could well be picked up coming and going, and the police immediately have something to work on as in over 80% of cases the suspect is recognized by somebody.

Whilst on the subject of cars, on the website Nextdoor Needham, there have been reports of catalytic converters being stolen. It is an



expensive piece of equipment to replace and the people who carry out this crime are very professional. It takes just 3 men 5 minutes to complete the job. One acts as lookout, one jacks up the car and the other uses an electric saw to take off the converter in one fell swoop! Of course, the police advise putting your car in your garage, if not park under a light with the exhaust side of the car next to a wall or a hedge. Don't make it easy for these rogues! Nowadays you can purchase dashcams that automatically come on if the car is knocked, which also helps. Whatever happens do talk to the police and then speak to your neighbours as someone somewhere may have seen something.

It is by working together that we can stop or deter the opportunist and professional thieves from operating in and around Needham Market.

Meadow Management in Needham Market

As you will have seen there are a number of areas in Needham Market where areas of green open space on housing estates are being managed differently by MSDC. As a result, the Town Council, as well as MSDC, have received several communications, some of which are in support of the policy and others which are not. In response to this, we have spoken to MSDC and discussed the subject at both a Town Council meeting and at the Needham Market Climate Action Group meetings (a sub-committee of the Town Council).

The **Background**

- MSDC have a meadow management policy which they have been running for several years.
- The goal is to create areas with lots of plant species. This takes time. At the end of the growing season, the areas are cut, and all the cuttings are removed. This progressively reduces soil fertility and increases plant diversity. Far from being a cost-cutting exercise, this is all about making our urban areas better for nature.
 - In Needham Market, the five designated areas for

trials are: Pinecroft Way; Junction of Quinton Road with Foxglove Avenue; Primrose Way; Hargrave Ave – opposite Primrose Way, and; Primrose Way – link via Lupin Way and Chainhouse Road.

What follows is a summary of responses from MSDC to specific lines of complaint.

Not 'No Mow May'...

The trial areas above are designated for Meadow Management. This is separate to the following:

- No Mow May.
- Management of grass verges, curb sides and roundabouts.

Housing estates are not appropriate locations:

- We are in the midst of a biodiversity crisis. We have lost 97% of our flower meadows since the 1960s. We have seen a 60% decline in flying insect numbers since 2004. Many, once common bird species, have declined enormously.
- In part, these declines are a result of the loss of meadows and other habitats, often replaced with housing estates. Farmland, amenity grassland and lawns support very few species.
- Creating areas of grassland with lots of plant species will support more insect species, which, in turn, will support more birds, etc.

The areas look unkempt, children cannot play there, the area is too large:

- This is subjective some like the appearance, some do not.
- MSDC have noted that in some of our five areas, pavement edges are not being kept short and desire line paths not mown. Ensuring that this is done in future will give a greater sense of order and intention.

- Children have been observed playing in the areas and mown paths through the meadows can encourage children to play.
- Over time, observation and feedback will inform MSDC which areas continue to be meadow managed, which return to being kept short and what works where in Needham Market. Not all areas will work.

The grass seed blows across gardens and tree saplings are growing where we do not need more trees:

- That happens already between mows.
- The tree saplings are not seedlings, but suckers growing from the roots of established trees. These will be cut down when the meadows receive their cuts and so will not be able to develop into trees.

The grass is too tall already and increasing in height:

- The grass grows until it flowers, sets seed and then dies back.
- It is now at the flowering and setting seed stage. It



should not get any taller than it is now (June).

People are leaving dog mess in the meadow:

• Dog owners shouldn't be leaving this. Dogs should normally be on leads and under the control of their owners, it is the owner's responsibility to make sure they go to the toilet on areas where they can easily clean up.

There was no consultation:

- Consultation has deliberately not happened ahead of the change as people's responses would have been based on their perceptions of what the areas would look like.
- Consultation forms part of the trial and is in the

form of communications received from members of the public whilst the areas are being trialled.

 Observation of how the areas develop, as well as feedback, will inform how the trial areas are managed in the future and which other areas in Needham Market would be suitable.

There should be a Council Tax refund for grass not being cut:

- MSDC are not legally obliged to cut the grass and council tax doesn't specify that it must be used for this.
- They are responsible for managing our open spaces and grass cutting is but one form of management.
- MSDC do not anticipate

any cost saving as whilst they may carry out fewer cuts, there is more work involved in cutting and clearing areas at the end of summer.

Some additional points:

- MDSC are learning and adapting as they learn how better to implement the change to meadow management.
- Rats do not live in long grass but will use the areas for transit. Meadows are not encouraging greater numbers,
- If you would like to see an example of a more established area which is an indication of what the aim is, please visit the green at Song Thrush Close on Cedar Park in

Stowmarket, IPI4 5WG.

It will take time for us to get used to having some areas meadow managed. Across the country more areas will be left like this and people will begin to accept it as part of the urban environment.

Grants/Donations

At a recent meeting of Council's Governance & Finance Committee, Councillors approved the following grants/donations: £2,500 to Citizen's Advice (Stowmarket & Needham Market) and £1,500 to Needham Market Community Centre as a contribution to the cost of operating the Community Minibus). Councillors also approved a £200 donation to the Suffolk Accident Rescue Service (SARS).

Needham Market Scout Hut Project

Welcome confirmation has been received that the application for grant support towards the cost of the replacement scout hut has been received from Mid Suffolk District Council. The grant is from Housing **Developer** Contributions to local infrastructure, in this case from the former Needham Market Chalk Quarry development. The grant is for £235,302. The total project cost is £329,000 and a further grant application is to be decided on, by the District Council, in September.

20's Plenty (Road Traffic Speed) for Suffolk Campaign

Councillors recently considered the campaign and its objectives. There are many areas of the country where the campaign is resulting in lower than general traffic speed restrictions in residential areas. The Needham Market Neighbourhood Plan includes a policy which seeks 20mph speed limits in the town, on roads that serve the main residential areas, in which case the Town Council is already on board with the objectives of the campaign. Councillors resolved to include further consideration of the campaign in scope of the Neighbourhood Plan review process.

Extended CCTV Coverage

The Council has resolved to procure additional CCTV equipment that will cover the new younger children's play area, adjacent to Needham Market Community Centre. Working with the Community Centre, the cost of the new equipment is £629.

Sustainable travel infrastructure



After a long period of being out of action, the electric vehicle, fast-charging point at Needham Market Lake has now been replaced and is up and running (see photo above). The costs of these chargers are being investigated with UK Power Networks and the deadline for this phase of charger installations is the 31st of March 2024. GP+ Extended Access Service for Cervical Screening

The 'Very Important Invitation' is a co-production between Suffolk GP+, Public Health bodies, local charities and is funded by the Cancer Alliance. Our aim is to increase the uptake of cervical screening across Suffolk.

We recognise that various communities are negatively impacted by health inequalities and our project aim is to reduce the barriers some individuals face when accessing screening.

Suffolk GP Federation is a notfor-profit community interest organisation owned by 57 GP practices covering 650,000 patients. We work throughout the county to provide education sessions to clinical and nonclinical members of staff. We also work with other charities and organisations to provide health education and promotion around cervical screening.

We will also support individuals on a 1:1 basis, providing tailored and individualised care, this could be for anyone who is finding it particularly difficult to attend for cervical screening.

Cervical screening can be very daunting for many reasons, and we want every woman and person with a cervix in Suffolk, to realise that no matter how you may feel about this mostly quick and simple procedure, we have everything in place to make sure that you feel happy and safe when you are with us.

The Suffolk GP Federation and co-producers have been working around the clock to create a testing service that is accessible to EVERYONE, with evening and weekend appointments to make sure that we can see even more people for screening. We understand that the screening process can make people feel physically and mentally vulnerable. So, whilst, in-clinic we will do everything to support you and make you feel safe... you are in control.

The cervical screening in GP+ will always be carried out by a female nurse, you can bring a friend or person of support, request a longer appointment, we can supply a translator, you can ask for a smaller speculum, listen to music and if you need us to stop, we will stop. These are just some of the many adjustments we can make to support you through the appointment.

Requesting an appointment is very straightforward using our booking request form on the website, or you can call your GP practice, but whichever method you use it is vital that you tell us if you need any extra support at your appointment. If you let us
